

CITYFEPS Rent Supplement Program:

The CITYFEPS Rent Supplement Program can help eligible families with children at risk of entry to shelter and those already in shelter to secure permanent housing. The number of households that can be approved to receive the CITYFEPS Rent Supplement will be limited due to available funding. Potentially eligible families will be connected with CITYFEPS providers (community-based organizations), which will assist the family in completing an application and locating housing.

HPD Section 8 Program:

Section 8, also known as the Housing Choice Voucher Program, provides federal funding for subsidies for eligible low-income families to rent decent, safe, and affordable housing in a neighborhood of their choice. Families pay a reasonable share of their income toward rent and the subsidy, paid by HPD directly to the landlord, makes up the difference, within specified limits.

HUD-Veteran Administration Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) Program:

The HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program is a collaborative effort between the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), and local public housing authorities. Under the HUD-VASH program eligible low-income veterans receive a Section 8 rental voucher alongside case management and supportive services from the VA at VA medical centers (VAMCs) and community-based outreach clinics.

Living In Communities (LINC) I Rental Assistance Program:

The LINC I Rental assistance program helps families in shelter who are working at least 35 hours a week but are unable to afford stable housing. The rental assistance program can help you move from temporary, emergency shelter back to the community as quickly as possible by paying a portion of your rent for one year, with an annual review to determine recertification; recertification will assess your current need and performance in the first year of the program. This new program is now available to help you move out of shelter. Due to available funding, only a limited number of the LINC I rental assistance payments will be issued. Consequently, not every family in the shelter system will be able to receive rental assistance.

Living In Communities (LINC) II Rental Assistance Program:

The LINC II rental assistance program helps families in shelter who have income but can't afford stable housing. The program can help you move from temporary, emergency shelter back to the community as quickly as possible by paying a portion of your rent for one year, with an annual review to determine recertification; recertification will assess your current need and performance in the first year of the program. This new program is now available to help you move out of shelter. Due to available funding, only a limited number of the LINC II rental assistance payments will be issued. Consequently, not every family in the shelter system will be able to receive rental assistance.

Living In Communities (LINC) III Rental Assistance Program:

The LINC III Rental assistance program helps families in shelter whose lives have been affected by domestic violence. The rental assistance program can help you move from temporary, emergency shelter back to the community as quickly as possible by paying a portion of your rent for one year, with an annual review to determine recertification; recertification will assess your current need and performance in the first year of the program. This new program is now available to help you move out of shelter. Due to available funding, only a limited number of the LINC III rental assistance payments will be issued. Consequently, not every family in the shelter system will be able to receive rental assistance.

Living In Communities (LINC) IV Rental Assistance Program:


The LINC IV Rental Assistance Program is currently targeted to individual adults and adult families in New York City Department of Homeless Services (DHS) shelters, safe havens and drop in centers who are, or include someone who is age 60 or above, who is in receipt of SSI, SSD, or veteran's disability benefits or compensation, or who is not currently in receipt of such benefits but determined by the New York City Human Resources Administration (HRA) to be potentially eligible for such benefits. LINC IV can help eligible households move from temporary, emergency shelter back to the community as quickly as possible by paying a portion of the household's rent for one year, with an annual review to determine recertification; recertification will assess the household's need for ongoing assistance. Due to available funding, only a limited number of households will receive LINC IV rental assistance. Consequently, not every client who meets the above criteria will be able to receive rental assistance.

Living In Communities (LINC) V Rental Assistance Program:

The LINC V Rental Assistance Program is targeted to individual adults and adult families in New York City Department of Homeless Services (DHS) shelters, safe havens and drop in centers who are working, but are unable to afford stable housing. LINC V can help eligible households move from temporary, emergency shelter back to the community as quickly as possible by paying a portion of the household's rent for one year, with an annual review to determine recertification; recertification will assess the household's need for ongoing assistance. Due to available funding, only a limited number of households will receive LINC V rental assistance. Consequently, not every client in the shelter system will be able to receive rental assistance.

Special Exit and Prevention Supplement (SEPS) Program:

The City's Special Exit and Prevention Supplement (SEPS) Program can help eligible individual adults and adult families (families without children) at risk of entry to shelter and those already in shelter to secure permanent housing. The number of households that can be approved to receive the SEPS Rent Supplement will be limited due to available funding. Potentially eligible individual adults and adult families will be connected with SEPS providers (community-based organizations), which will assist the household in completing an application and locating housing. For households in shelter, New York City Department of Homeless Services (DHS) housing specialists and case managers will also be available to provide assistance.


